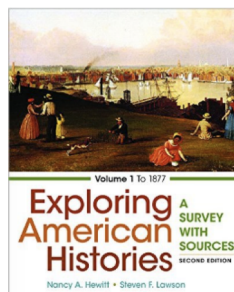

Quizzes:

There will be 9 quizzes during the semester. Quizzes will help you learn how I ask questions in a low cost assessment. The **top 5 quizzes** (each worth 20 points) will constitute your quiz grade.

Writing Assignment:

You will find this information under the LESSONS tab on D2L in the folder labeled WRITING ASSIGNMENT. Please read ALL MATERIAL in the folder. The rough draft for the writing assignment will be **DUE on October 23** by 11:45pm. This is worth **20 points**. The final writing assignment is worth **80 points** and is **DUE on November 29** by 11:45pm.

Online Discussion Board Assignments:

We will use our discussion board to discuss the primary documents and videos in their historical contexts. Please read the chapters in your textbook first, then the documents (or sometimes watch videos that are in the PowerPoints). The textbook material will give you the historical context for the documents and videos. The more you read and interact in our virtual classroom, the more you will get out of the class, the more interesting the class will be, and the easier the exams will be.

Your participation in online discussions will be graded based on your active involvement in these course discussions. This assignment is worth **20% of your course grade**.

- Each student must log on to the discussion board each assigned week and participate in the online discussions that I will set up for you.
- My expectations are that you post a response to the initial question or topics I present on the discussion board AND that you then respond to each other's posts.
- Your posts and responses must be on time and must directly respond to the questions and topics for that week in order for you to receive full credit.
- For each week, I will indicate how many times you must post and how many responses to other posts you are responsible for. Of course, you may always go beyond that number.

Online Etiquette:

One of the virtues of an online class discussion is that no one is too shy to talk!!! I will ask you, though, to please be respectful and civil to each other and to use appropriate language (no cursing, degrading, or insulting individuals or the whole class or the teacher!!). The discussions should stay on topic and be historical in content. I will read and join in the discussions, when appropriate, so please discuss in a language and tone that you would use if you were in the classroom. If I feel that you have exceeded the boundaries of proper discussion board etiquette, I will delete your post and contact you individually by KSU email with an explanation. Any subsequent offenses will result in your being banned from the discussion board, which would negatively impact your grade.

Exams:

There will be three exams, each worth **200 points**. All exams will be comprised of multiple choice and short answer/essay questions covering only the textbook chapters indicated on the course schedule. Study guides for each exam can be found on D2L.

All three exams will be non-cumulative. An essay make-up test will be issued in the event of an excused absence.

Makeup Exams and Late Assignments: All assignments should be completed on the dates indicated. If you know of an upcoming absence, email me the circumstances and provide the necessary documentation. Relating to writing assignments, there is a five-point penalty per day past the due date.

The History Department has a single Make-Up Exam Day on **Friday, December 1 from 1-4pm** in SO 3023. (This is the Friday prior to finals week.) You **MUST** be on the approved Make-Up list **BEFORE** you can take a missed exam. Acceptable documentation will need to be provided.

Students are evaluated on the following scale:

I—Indicates an incomplete grade for the course, and will be awarded only when the student has done satisfactory work up to the last two weeks of the semester, but for nonacademic reasons beyond his/her control is unable to meet the full requirements of the course.

Incomplete grades are only valid after submission of the Incomplete Grade form (signed by both the instructor and student) to the Department Chair's office.

Grading Policy:

Students must wait 24 hours from the return of a graded assignment to contact the instructor about the grade. If no contact is made regarding a grade within 7 days from the return of the graded assignment, the grade becomes final.
